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

Introduction

he Poverty-Environment Action Helpdesk is a one-stop point of contact that provides stakeholders with centralized information services on the main-streaming of poverty-environment objectives into policy, budgeting, programming and investments, in support of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. The webinar will cover the Help Desk and its 4 main areas of service; Technical Advisory Services, knowledge management, resource mobilization, and partnerships.

OPENING REFLECTIONS MODERATOR: DR. LINXIU ZHANG

Director of the UNEP International Ecosystem Management Partnership

- Since 2018, the Poverty Environment Action for Sustainable Development Goals Project has been battling the approach of mainstream environmental sustainability and climate objectives of the poverty eradication into development planning, budgeting and the monetary systems, public and private finance and investment in 8 full fledged countries, and the five technical assistance projects.
- Poverty Environment Action views on the deep experiences of the predecessor project as Michael said the Poverty Environment Initiative. Over the past decade, PEA has pioneered integrated approaches to mainstreaming poverty environmental linkages in national development planning and implementation processes in more than 20 countries in support of national efforts to achieve the Millennium Development Goals.
- This project can now be seen as a pioneer model and the practical example of how to implement sustainable development in a way that contributes to the umbrella objective of Agenda 2030, which is the eradication of poverty in all its forms and dimensions. In this sense, it responds to the new framework put in place by the United Nations reforms since 2019 called the United Nations Sustainable Development Corporation framework.
- This framework aims at improving the United Nations ability to support countries in delivering on Agenda 2030, and the Sustainable Development Goals at the national level, through an integrated social, economic, environment approach.
- The UN Sustainable Development Corporation framework also relies heavily on and improves the development coordination at national level, particularly through an empowered resident coordinator system.
- In each country, the Resident Coordinator now has enhanced the power to lead the UN country team to design

- more coordinated programs aligned with national priorities and to deliver coherently on the national aspirations for SDGs.
- We are pleased to see some representatives of Resident Coordinators offices with us here today. Welcome, as we hope that this would be able to further support the work of the Resident Coordinator offices.
- Over the years, our pioneer project, UNDP UNEP Poverty Environment Action received repeatedly requests for support for mainstream in poverty environment. This request came from an additional 20 countries to those already involved in our project. We're therefore responding to this demand by creating this Help desk or service that will be open to all members to jointly provide ongoing Technical Advisory and information on poverty environment mainstreaming.
- The Help desk supports the delivery of virtual Technical Advisory and knowledge management services, strengthening access remotely to the experiences and lessons of poverty environment mainstreaming gained over the 17 year Life of PEI and the Poverty Environment Action now. It is part of the Poverty Environment Action Virtual Capacity Building Platform, and it will support the legacy of this pioneer projects.
- I wish today's webinar will be a valuable asset for all the participants.

- The Help desk was activated on 9th February in response to request from the Poverty Environment Action Project Board, as well as other partners who are looking for information on poverty environment mainstreaming.
- It will further provide support on the framework for the contribution of the UNDP and UNEP's joint work on Poverty Environment and Climate mainstreaming after the conclusion of the Poverty Environment Action Project in December 2022.
- The purpose of the Help desk is to provide a platform for sustainability of the work that Poverty Environment Initiative and the Poverty Environment Action that have been going on for the past 10 years.
- The Help desk will be housed at the poverty environment action website that is www. pea4sdgs.org. Under the About Us drop down menu, there is the Help desk, and the Help Desk focal point contacts for each of the four areas we've introduced today- knowledge management partnerships resource mobilizationand technical assistance.
- The Knowledge Chapter contains PEA's guidance documents, the most important ones are found in the Publications gallery. There are more than 60 different publications here, including on lessons learned, on our project experience in our methodologies.
- The newest addition to our knowledge management package are thematic galleries- the themes of economic valuation analysis, gender and social inclusion, integrated ecosystems assessments and public expenditure reviews. This is a way of clustering the different guidance documents, briefings, reports, and the knowledge products that people might find interesting so they can deep dive directly. 


The Helpdesk was activated on 9 February 2021 in response to a request from the Poverty-Environment Action Project Board at their meeting in December 2020.

Thus, the Helpdesk is envisaged to remain operational through at least 2025.

Technical Assistance

Providing Technical Assistance on poverty-environment mainstreaming to selected countries, regions and sub-regions that do not have a full-fledged country PEA project.



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


Poll Results And Ranking



- The highest ranking is 'combining our organizations' efforts through partnership strengthens delivery and implementation of the 2030 Agenda for members' at 71%

PARTICIPANT Q&A:

1. Sheilah Ochugboju, Coordinator for a network of African women environmentalists

- How will these wonderful resources, gathered over nearly two decades, and are putting and are giving people access to, actually make the connection? How will PEA stimulate an appetite to interact with the Help desk or the platform? How do you ensure that that interaction comes from those that need it most? And those that need it most are not those that normally go on websites and write, request and chat and wait for a few days for responses. They are the ones really at the poverty environment nexus- mostly women and young people.
- Is there any mechanism to draw these communities towards these resources, but also create a framework to measure how they're using them, and what impact those valuable resources are to them in their lives that could be calculated and transformative?
- How will they get the middle tier category of people like government advisors, strategic advisors to for example the Minister of Environment, to eat for free the information to be contextualized, and to mediate between your platform and real people on the ground?

Response by Michael

- We need to recognize that the virtual quality of some of the services are limiting and will not reach those who are not well connected, those who do not enjoy internet connectivity, and that includes groups that represent women and groups that represent the poor in many of the countries PEA works in.
- It had been the practice to work in country through workshops directly with the communities that we that we seek to serve and mobilize. For example, in Rwanda, working with women's collectivities and women's organizations that were directly participating in trainings on on how to market their goods and products in a sustainable manner. This is part of an initiative to cut down on the use of single use plastics that was a priority of the Rwandan government.
- In Peru, they worked directly with scavenger communities and organized them into legal associations so they could get training on how to recycle material and and secure also their livelihoods. In Uruguay a similar project was done. There is experience in working directly with groups,

but under the conditions that prevail today, there's been no travel and face to face meetings in many of the countries.

- PEA is working with UNITAR to develop a massive open online course that would be self paced and that individuals and groups could join and and work through the materials in a way that would be engaging and not only informative but even entertaining. The plan is to begin the rollout of that MOOC, or Massive Open Online Course in June.
- Working directly with communities is something that through our partnerships we would hope to again do in the future.

Question by Steve Bass

• How far is this building a community of practice? Because, Help desk is a little bit sort of one way, training is a bit one way, even webinars are outwards. What's the vision in terms of building a community around these issues? There's a need for those on working on poverty and those are working on environment to come together.

Response by Jacinta

- Yes, we are moving towards developing communities of practice, because right now the focus is on closing up the project in 2022. PEA is moving towards development of community of practice globally and at country level.
- Poverty Environment Action has been working at country level, through UNDP country offices, and also through governments at national level but also district level. Partnerships have been built at national level, at district level, and community level. For example, in Malawi we work with UN Women who have different women groups, and farmer organizations at district level that we have worked with FAO to provide the capacity building in specific areas of climate smart agriculture.
- The hope is to continue working with those networks, from community level to district level to national level. And that those networks that have been built are going to continue linking this knowledge and information to the communities and to the districts and to the nations and also to the global level that will need this type of information.
- PEA wants to continue this network by linking the ones that are able to access the Help desk, to be able to have these services. Once they have the services and the knowledge that is being shared, they can disseminate it to the ones that actually need it at local level and continue the partnerships with them.

Response by Michael

- In 2022, in the work plan for Poverty Environment Action we expect to be working more on the communities of practice platform.
- There are discussions with Green Growth Knowledge Partnership, which has recently launched the Green Forum, looking to see if they can build out those communities in a way that would be serviced beyond the life of the current project Poverty Environment Action, using those partnerships and using those tools.
- There's more work to be done and the hope is to meet the promise of communities of practice.

Response by Henry


• Now that there's a Help desk platform out there, the participants on this forum and others could use that platform to drop us line, so that there can be further engagement in this type of discussion.


